Celebrate National Library Week—April 4-10



National Library Week is a national observance sponsored by the American Library Association and libraries across the country each April. It is a time to celebrate the contributions of our nation's libraries and librarians and to promote library use and support. The American Library Association theme for this year is "Welcome To Your Library." This theme promotes the idea that libraries extend far beyond the four walls of a building and that everyone is welcome to use their services. Activities will be held throughout the week to celebrate. The Norris J. Millet, Sr. Library (Central) is hosting "If You Love Your Library, Leave a Heart" for the entire week. Children, ages 5 and over are welcome to decorate a paper heart to be placed on a paper quilt. The Central Library will also host "What I Love About My Library." Patrons of all

ages will be able to leave opinions and suggestions on sticky notes and place them on a heart shaped plaque in the foyer of the library. A "Scavenger Hunt" will be held at the Leroy D. Williams Memorial Library (Reserve) for patrons of all ages. A list of questions and clues about the library or items around the library will be given to all who would like to participate. Once the form is completed, turned in, and correct, patrons will be eligible to win a prize. The Frazee-Harris Memorial Library (Garyville) will also host a "Scavenger Hunt." Painted rocks will be hidden around Garyville that are decorated to look like books. Once found, patrons can bring their rock to the library to check out the book illustrated on the rock and receive a prize. The Garyville Library will also host "Puzzle Week." Mazes, word searches, and crossword puzzles for all ages will be available at the library. The Roland Borne Sr. Memorial Library (Edgard) will host "Welcome to Your Library." Patrons who visit the library on Tuesday, April 6th, are welcome to talk to the new staff members about program ideas, book suggestions, or any other information that would be valuable to the library. - ◇ The Library of Congress, founded in 1800, is the largest library in the world, with more than 155 million items on approximately 838 miles of bookshelves.
- ◇ America's first lending library was established in 1731 in Philadelphia by Benjamin Franklin; paving the way for the library systems we use in North America today.
- ◇ Famous librarians throughout history have included Mao Zedong, Golda Meir, Laura Bush, Marcel Proust, Lewis Carroll, Casanova, and Jorge Luis Borges.

Worse, she can’t seem to move past the horrors of the war with Hybern and all she lost in it.” **Genre: Science Fiction**



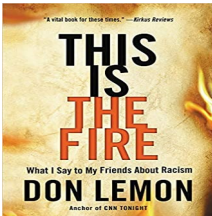

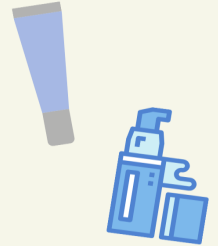
Delirium by Lauren Oliver

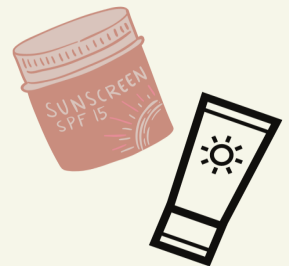


