





HISTORY

Hispanic Heritage Month was established to honor Latinx contributions and highlight new ones going forward. Latino American countries started gaining their independence between the years of 1804 and 1826. The French colony of Haiti was the first Latin country to gain its independence on January 1, 1804, followed by Colombia becoming the first Spanish country to gain independence on July 20, 1810.

The history of Hispanic Heritage Month traces back to 1968, where it began as a smaller celebration known as Hispanic Heritage Week. It became a month-long celebration after being signed into law by President Reagan in 1988. September 15 was chosen as the start of Hispanic Heritage Month as a tribute to the anniversary of Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, and Nicaragua's Declaration of Independence from Spain.

Today, Hispanic Heritage Month reminds us of how much strength we draw as a country from our roots and values as a nation of immigrants. Hispanic and Latinx individuals now make up approximately 19% of our country's total population, impacting every facet of American culture.







A library card unlocks a world of possibilities, from books and other physical resources inside our branches to genealogical databases, educational courses, and an everexpanding digital library at your fingertips with any mobile device.


